

It all started when I was very young! I was born March 5, 1952 while my family was living on a farm in Waterford, Wisconsin. I was the youngest of five with two older sisters and two older brothers.

Although my dad loved farming, my mom was a city girl, so after many years of farm life—in the middle of raising five children and taking care of 26 foster children—my mother told my dad she was moving back to the city with or without him.

We moved back to Milwaukee when I was five. My parents together began to operate small restaurants throughout my childhood. As I grew up, with very little direction from my parents, I experienced neglect, bullying, and physical abuse from my brothers, classmates and a church leader. I had very little guidance because my parents believed that sending me to parochial school would help me. Unfortunately, it did not. I only experienced guilt, shame, hypocrisy, and an unholy fear of God. At the age of 16, I left the church and lived the next eight years in a sea of drugs, alcohol, and feel-good living. At age 21, I got a job working in an auto factory, which allowed me to buy cars and motorcycles and fueled my carefree and careless living.

At the age of 24, I began to tire of a life that had no direction and my feel-good living became shallow. I wanted to change. I quit drugs and used alcohol sparingly, began meditation, and tried

college.

During my freshman year, I met a girl who asked me if I'd ever considered the claims of Jesus. I told her, "I tried religion and it doesn't work." After a few discussions and a few curious trips out to Elmbrook Church, I heard I could have a personal relationship with Jesus by confessing my sin and He could forgive me and help me live without guilt and shame if I invited Him to live inside me by His Holy Spirit.

Although I was skeptical of this new idea, I began to read the Bible and one day I read Psalm 2:7 which says, "You are my Son, today I have become your Father." I knew at that moment I felt His forgiveness, the guilt and shame left me, and I experienced forgiveness.

Over the next four years, I grew stronger in my faith and graduated from college—a miracle in itself. During my senior year (the fall of 1979), I met my future wife, Paula, through a Bible study I was co-leading. We were married in August of 1980.

After three years of a wonderful marriage, things began to change. We were swindled out of half our savings, we'd just co-purchased a duplex, and Paula had quit her job because we were expecting our first child. Two years later, we had our second child and we continued to struggle. I felt like a failure, as did Paula. It seemed like nothing was going right and we didn't like each other. We

tried some counseling, but that only got us into more debt. I was tempted to separate, because I couldn't handle the stress any longer. All I experienced was anger, fear, disappointment, sadness. At our wit's end, we sought help from two Eastbrook pastors: Dave Brown and Dolores Wenzler. After a summer of private counseling, one day we all got on our knees and prayed together. Over the next year I knew God was challenging me to honor my marriage vows and learn to love and accept my wife no matter what our struggles were. I knew God was telling me I needed to be faithful to her and my kids, and things would aet better.

I read James 1:2-4 which said: "Count it all joy, my brothers whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith develops perseverance. Perseverance must finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything."

I recommitted myself to love my wife no matter what my circumstances were, and things did get better. I got a better job, Paula got stronger due to my acceptance and support, and we were able to raise two wonderful kids into adulthood. We couldn't be happier as a couple—now married for 34 years and more in love each year. We are experiencing I Corinthians 2:9, which says, "No eye has seen, no ear heard, no mind has conceived, what God has prepared for those who love him."

I have been attending Eastbrook since my sophomore year of high school. I became a member my senior year of

# Describe one or two memorable church experiences.

Going into my first fall retreat as a high schooler, I was nervous because I was new, didn't know a lot of people, and tend to shy away from big crowds. But God really put things in perspective, provided new friends—and they are still some of my closest friends today. On that retreat, I realized that He really did desire a relationship with me.

Another memorable experience for me was this past summer with the Wilderness Trip to Colorado. It was my first big trip as a leader, not a student. you or someone in your family gets a diagnosis of diabetes, heart disease or cancer, chances



are you will go to someone at the church for prayer and help. Christians rally around the sufferers, offering spiritual and practical support and resources. It is wonderful to see the body of Christ at work!

But have you noticed that when someone is diagnosed with a mental illness, it's not the same? The church (not just Eastbrook!) has been weak in helping its members and their families cope with mental illnesses. A lot of this is due to ignorance and maybe fear—but now is the time to change all that.

Beginning in February, Eastbrook is going to be offering a 12-week educational course developed by NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness) called *Family to Family*, to help families of those with mental illness understand diagnoses, medications, resources, advocacy, etc. Eastbrook's class will be faith-based and people will be invited to stay around for a while after the classes to pray together. We are hoping and praying that Family to Family will help many people. Who knows what will come next—a support group for families? A support group for those with mental illness? An educational workshop for the whole church?

# COUNCIL PROFILE MANUEL ROSADO

In the summer of 1999, through a job transfer, our family moved to Milwaukee and we have been attending Eastbrook ever since. We chose Eastbrook for its solid Biblical teaching, rich diversity, and commitment to serving the community both locally and abroad. My wife, Kari, started attending Eastbrook as a teenager, and it's where her parents, Lys and Jim Reiskytl, remain actively involved to this day. We are excited to worship, to grow and to serve here, as well as, to call Eastbook Church our home.

In Mark 19:14, Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these." In fact, Kari and I were the first couple to get married on the current Eastbrook Church campus in 1996, and enjoyed a bilingual celebration led by Pastor Marc Erickson and Pastor Jose Padín.

Our family's faith has deepened through opportunities provided here at Eastbrook. Beginning with dedicating Raquel and Marcos to the Lord: individually and corporately. Then, walking alongside of them as they worked through their Faith Markers, and now bridging



with them as they dig deeper into the Word through youth group opportunities like their retreats and the Go Conference this summer. We are truly blessed by those who faithfully serve at Eastbrook.
