RESET

Reset is a word that means literally to set again or set anew. Other ways to say it would be Renewed, Regenerated, Reworked, Revitalized

Christ's church has endured for over 2000 years, yet these past few years have tested it in many ways we never expected. Old ways of worshipping and being the church together have been disrupted, for better and worse.

As we come out of the COVID pandemic, it's time to refocus our efforts and yes, reset ourselves on those things that make the church relevant to our lives and impactful in our community. Fortunately, Hebrews 10:24 & 25 give us these words of wisdom:

"And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching."

This fall, as an entire congregation, we will endeavor to press into these ideas and experience a reset:

- A Reset on Love,
- a Reset on Service,
- a Reset on Gathering, and
- a Reset in Light of our Eternity Together.

For four weeks – all of our ministry focus, all of our small groups, all of our Bible studies, all of our Sunday morning classes will be oriented around this reset.

For some of you it will be a homecoming of sorts, an opportunity to reengage in the practices that you had to step away from these past few years. For others, it will be a fresh opportunity to step into life in the church at its fullest. Either way – we look forward to what God will do as we Reset!

Be sure to take time to pray for and with each other each week! At the back of this booklet, you'll find a spot to keep track of prayer requests.

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
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WEEK 1:

SERMON OUTLINE:

Sunday, September 11, 2022 · Hebrews 10:24-25, Colossians 3:12-17 · Pastor Matt Erickson

"Let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching." (Hebrews 10:24-25)

"Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. ¹³ Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. ¹⁴ And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity.

¹⁵ Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, since as members of one body you were called to peace. And be thankful. ¹⁶ Let the message of Christ dwell among you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom through psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit, singing to God with gratitude in your hearts. ¹⁷ And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him " (Colossians 3:12-17)



DIG IN

This week's study focuses on the first part of Hebrews 10:24, related to loving one another. Begin your study in prayer by asking God to speak to you through His Word, and then read those two verses aloud.

3. When you think about the church, which of these Scriptural images is the first that jumps into your mind and why?
 - Church as bride of Christ
 - Church as body of Christ
 - Church as new temple/building
 - Church as family of God
4. Read Colossians 3:12-17 aloud. Why do you think verse 12 begins with an emphasis on character before relationship?
5. What stands out to you most in verse 13?
6. Why do you think Paul writes in verse 14 that love "*binds them all together in perfect unity*"?

7. How have you learned to let Christ's peace take root in your life as Paul says in verse 15?
8. What sort of activity does Paul describe in verse 16 for the community of Christ?
9. Of all the things Paul challenges us to do as the "Family of God" in this passage, which would you say are hardest to do? Which do you think are the easiest?
10. What do you think it would look like if the Church really operated according to these instructions?
11. Is there anything else from the video or the sermon that you wanted to discuss?

Have everyone in the group answer at least one of these questions:

12. What is one thing God is revealing to you through this study about how you might need a reset on love?
13. Why do you think it is important for you to find those you can call "your people" within a Christian community?

SERMON OUTLINE:

Sunday, September 18, 2022 · Hebrews 10:24, Romans 12:3-8 · Pastor Matt Erickson

"Let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching." (Hebrews 10:24-25)

"For by the grace given me I say to every one of you: Do not think of yourself more highly than you ought, but rather think of yourself with sober judgment, in accordance with the faith God has distributed to each of you. ⁴ For just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, ⁵ so in Christ we, though many, form one body, and each member belongs to all the others. ⁶ We have different gifts, according to the grace given to each of us. If your gift is prophesying, then prophesy in accordance with your faith; ⁷ if it is serving, then serve; if it is teaching, then teach; ⁸ if it is to encourage, then give encouragement; if it is giving, then give generously; if it is to lead, do it diligently; if it is to show mercy, do it cheerfully." (Romans 12:3-8)


A Reset on How the Church Serves as a Body (Romans 12:3-8)

- Like a body, the church has differing abilities in differing parts
- Like a body, the church requires every part actively using its gifts





3. Explore the idea of the church as the body of Christ by reading aloud and considering some of these Scripture passages:

- 1 Corinthians 12:12-31
- Ephesians 3:6
- Ephesians 4:4, 15-16
- Colossians 1:18, 24
- Colossians 2:19

4. What jumps out to you as you read/hear what Paul is writing in these verses?

11. What has been the best experience you've had serving in the church? What made it so good?

12. Is there anything else from the video or the sermon that you wanted to discuss?

DIG DEEPER

This week dig deeper in one or more of the following ways:

- Memorize some portion or all of either Hebrews 10:24-25 or Romans 12:3-8.
- Pray about that and then make a list of spiritual gifts and talents God has blessed you with that you are aware. Perhaps you could discuss this list with someone close to you so you both can grow in your faith and service.
- Set aside space and time this week to meditate on Romans 12:3-8. Let the Lord search through your heart and mind about your love for Him and for others. Ask the Lord to direct you in service within the church for His glory.
- Read Henry Blackaby's book, *What's So Spiritual About Your Gifts?*, to discover how our gifting and service is a reflection of the Holy Spirit's work in our lives.

Gathering Together to Worship

- In the Old Testament
 - » God’s idea, God’s command
 - » Festivals at temple in Jerusalem, then synagogues
 - » Psalm 100, the reset psalm
- In the New Testament
 - » Jesus’ insistence on it
 - “Wherever 2 or 3 of you are gathered...” (Mt 18:20)
 - “I will build my church...” (Mt 16:18)
 - John 17 prayer
 - Institution of the Lord’s Supper
 - » Early Christian gatherings
 - In addition to synagogue gatherings
 - House churches

Hebrews passage – Some Christians Gave Up Meeting Together

- Reasons they might have done so
 - » Fear of authorities
 - » Fear of mockery

- » Laziness
- » Dislike of other Christians
- » Disappointment that Jesus hadn't come back yet
- The fires of Rome (64 AD)
 - » Nero's making Christians the scapegoat
 - » Danger of abandoning the Christian faith


Why We Need to Gather in Person Corporately Today

- Because we are in danger
- Because it pleases God
- Because the physical presence of other Christians is God's gift to us



DIG IN

This week's study focuses on part of verse 25 related to the importance of our gathering together as God's people. Begin your study in prayer by asking God to speak to you through His Word, and then read Hebrews 10:24-25 aloud.

3. Describe one difficulty and one blessing you can experience when you go to in-person worship services.

4. What are some good reasons for retaining online services (besides convenience)?

5. What are some of the ways attending in-person worship services can stretch us in ways that participating only online might not? Do you believe there are ways to overcome this? How?

6. Discuss this quote about gathering with other Christians: "What is an unspeakable gift of God for the lonely individual is easily disregarded and trodden under foot by those who have the gift every day." (Bonhoeffer, *Life Together*).

7. Read Psalm 100 aloud. What does this psalm tell us about God's acts?

8. What does it tell us about God's character?

9. What do you think verse 3 tells us about our status and relationship with God?
10. In what ways do you think we can see God's faithfulness to all generations (verse 5) when we come to in-person worship services?
11. Is there anything else from the video or the sermon that you wanted to discuss?



LIVE IT OUT

Have everyone in the group answer at least one of these questions:

12. What is one way God is speaking to you through this study about how and how often you gather with others for worship? How can this group help you respond to what God is showing you?
13. In Psalm 100, the writer gives us six reasons for praising God. Which of the six most motivates you to praise Him?
14. It can be easy to drift into sporadic attendance patterns for worship. What commitment to attending worship regularly can you make? Who will you ask to hold you accountable to it?

WEEK 4:

A RESET IN LIGHT OF THE END



SERMON OUTLINE:

Sunday, October 2, 2022 · Hebrews 10:25; 9:27-28; 11:13-16; Revelation 22:20 · Pastor Matt Erickson

"Let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching." (Hebrews 10:24-25)

"Just as people are destined to die once, and after that to face judgment, ²⁸ so Christ was sacrificed once to take away the sins of many; and he will appear a second time, not to bear sin, but to bring salvation to those who are waiting for him." (Hebrews 9:27-28)

"All these people were still living by faith when they died. They did not receive the things promised; they only saw them and welcomed them from a distance, admitting that they were foreigners and strangers on earth. ¹⁴ People who say such things show that they are looking for a country of their own. ¹⁵ If they had been thinking of the country they had left, they would have had opportunity to return. ¹⁶ Instead, they were longing for a better country—a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God, for he has prepared a city for them." (Hebrews 11:13-16)

"He who testifies to these things says, 'Yes, I am coming soon.' Amen. Come, Lord Jesus." (Revelation 22:20)

The Challenge of Time in Our Day

- Instant society and the warping of time: expectation of speed
- COVID and the warping of time: slowing down and confusion
- The challenge of time in the day when Hebrews was written

A Reset on Time with Faith, Hope, and Love (Hebrews 10:23-25; 11:1)

- Faith holds what is not seen
- Hope grasps the future yet to be realized
- Love lives in the present in light of the future

A Reset for the Long Haul (Hebrews 10:25; 9:27-28; 11:13-16; Revelation 22:20)

- The reality of the end and Christ's *parousia*
- The call to perseverance until that day: "a long obedience in the same direction"
- The call to waiting in the in-between: "Come, Lord Jesus!"
- The anticipation of fullness: "a better country"



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

3. Our society is often fast-paced and eager for instant gratification. How did your experience of time during the lockdown and the pandemic change?
4. Who has been an example of "long haul" faith for you in journey with God? What do you think has helped them maintain their faith through the years?

5. Explore the concept of “The Day of the Lord” by reading aloud and considering some or all of these Scripture passages (read at least 5!):

- Ezekiel 13:5, 30:3
- Joel 1:15, 2:1,11,31; 3:14
- Amos 5:18,20

- Acts 2:20
- 1 Corinthians 5:5
- 2 Corinthians 1:14
- 1 Thessalonians 5:2
- 2 Thessalonians 2:2
- 2 Peter 3:10
- Revelation 6:17; 16:14

6. What have you learned about “The Day of the Lord” from what you’ve read?

7. In Hebrews 10:24-25, what do you think the writer is trying to tell his original readers about the journey of faith based on the final phrase of verse 25?

8. What would you say are the biggest barriers that keep us from loving, serving, and meeting together over the long haul of faith?

9. These four weeks were meant to be a starting point for some and a reengagement for others...what will you do coming out of these four weeks to stay actively engaged in growing your faith as part of the Eastbrook family? SMALL GROUP AGREEMENT:

Small Groups at Eastbrook Church exist to promote community, discipleship, and engagement with God's mission through meaningful Christian relationships and study of God's Word (Hebrews 10:24-25).

WE'LL DO THIS BY FOCUSING ON FOUR PRIMARY ACTIVITIES:

Sharing Time Together – Think about sharing a simple meal or snack as a group. Breaking Bread together will give us relational time to invest in each other and build community.

Group Discussions – Engage in Bible study together. We will discuss what it means and how we can put it into practice in our daily lives.

Social Events – Periodically, we will have special events we do together as groups to share in celebrations and simply enjoy moments of life together (Christmas parties, Thanksgiving meals, cookouts, etc.).

Engaging in God's Mission – We are a group of individual missionaries who will support each other with the various mission/evangelistic opportunities God has given each of us (at home, work, neighborhood etc.) through prayer and accountability.

SMALL GROUP CORE VALUES:

Safe Environment - To help create a safe place where people can be heard and feel loved, please don't respond with quick answers, snap judgments, or overly simple fixes.

Respect for Differences – Remember to be gentle and gracious to people at different levels of spiritual maturity. Allow people's thoughts and opinions to be heard. Commit to cooperatively working with people who have different temperaments. Know that people will have imperfections. Respect each other and realize we are all are all works in progress and desiring to grow.

Confidentiality – Keep anything that is shared strictly confidential and within the group. Avoid sharing information about fellow group members or their associates with people outside of the group.

OTHER GROUP DETAILS/VALUES:

1. Group night: When will we meet? Where will we meet?
2. Children: How will children function within our group? (Participate in our group study? Have a study of their own? Enjoy a time of recreation together? No kids? Who will coordinate?)
3. Topic: What will we study? For how long?
4. Prayer: Do we agree to pray for one another regularly?
5. Meals/snacks: Who will coordinate? (Take turns? Sign-up sheet?)
6. Anything else we should agree to or discuss?
